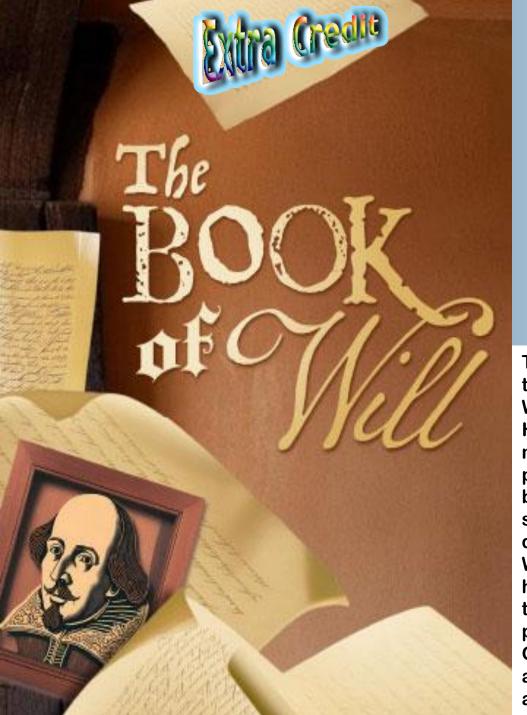

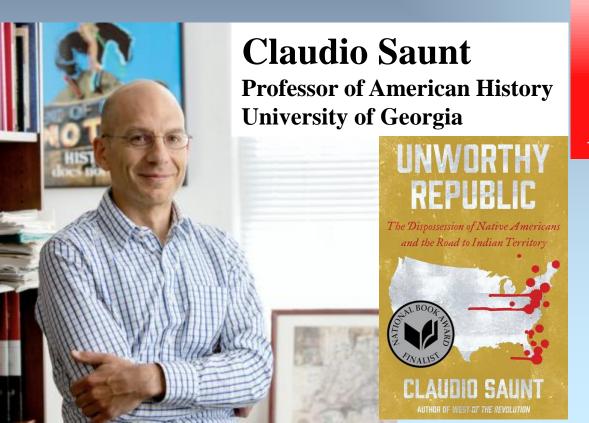

The *Book of Will* by Lauren Gunderson is a play that is set in 1623, after the tragic death of William Shakespeare.

His closest friends and fellow actors deeply miss him and his beautiful plays. When a pirated, badly botched Hamlet ("To be or not to be, there's the point . . .") plays on a nearby stage, they realize Shakespeare's lines are disappearing into the forgetful memory of time. What they need is a book—a definitive copy of his original plays, but to make one, they'll have to battle an unscrupulous publisher, a boozy poet laureate and their own mortality. Lauren Gunderson's look at Shakespeare's First Folio is a lively, funny, poignant love letter to theatre and the printed word.




First Carolingian king

Decent enough, but not strong enough to hold the empire together. His succession plan was changed when he had a 4th son. This sparked 3 civil wars

Supported the Pope's decision about ending divorce stating that:

"even though she were sterile, deformed, old, dirty, drunken, a frequenter of bad company, lascivious, vain, greedy, unfaithful, quarrelsome, abusive . . . For when that man was free, he freely engaged himself."



The end of an Empire


Louis' plan to divide empire with 3 sons as "kings" does Not work, but will give Europe France & Germany


Viking siege of Paris – 885-6


700 ships & 30,000 men Charles the Fat

50% faster longer workday eat oats, not just grass



Europe 800-1000 A.D. 4-5 times heaver load



Europe 900 A.D. greater traction when wet










Agriculture Two-Field System

Older method was 2 field rotation WHEAT / FALLOW

Field 1: Wheat

Field 2: Fallow

Low yield crops – no excess crops during drought years


lay (and clerical) elite


Vassal = Celtic for "servant"

In feudalism it's your count that votes





Villeins (in the city-villains)





Very little "cash wages" so how did the peasants merchants and farmers pay their taxes?







