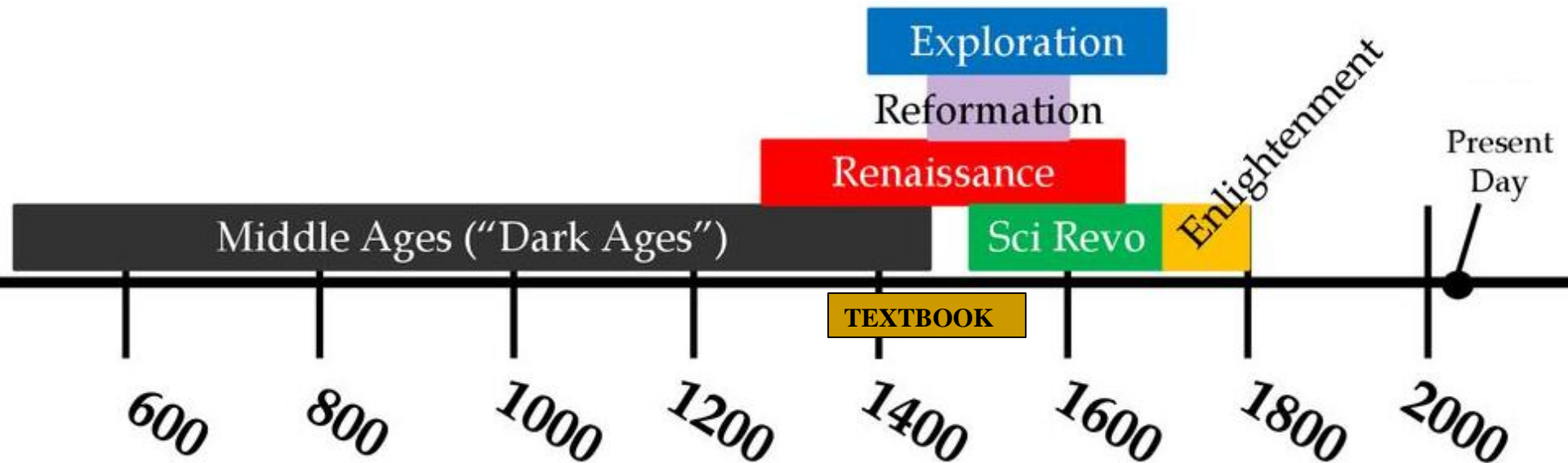

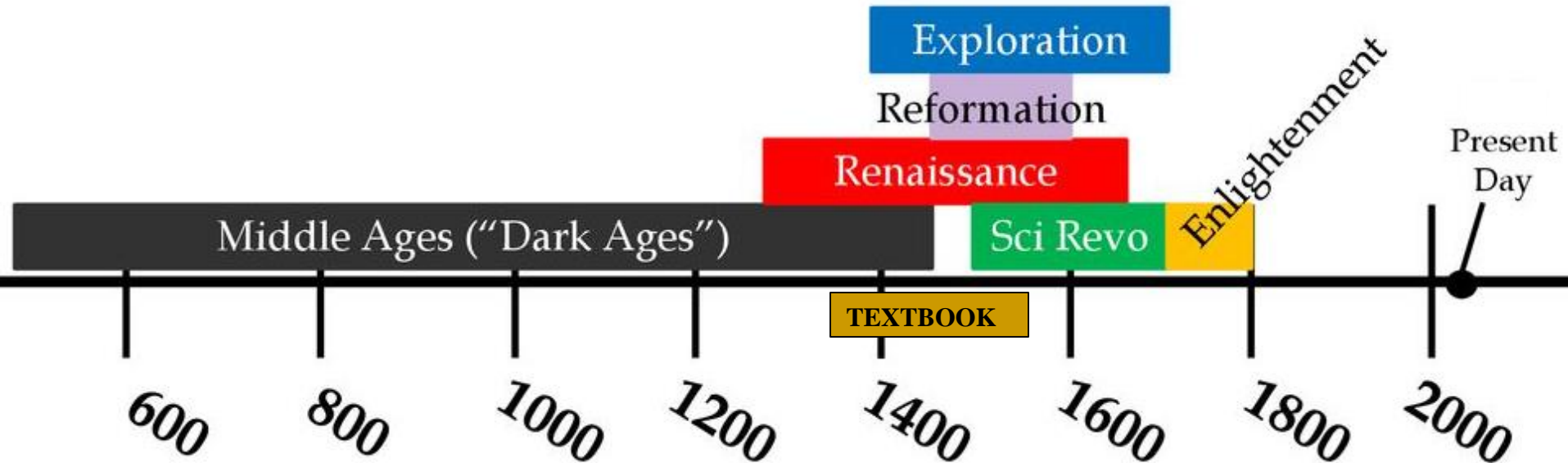

“Politics have no relation to morals.”

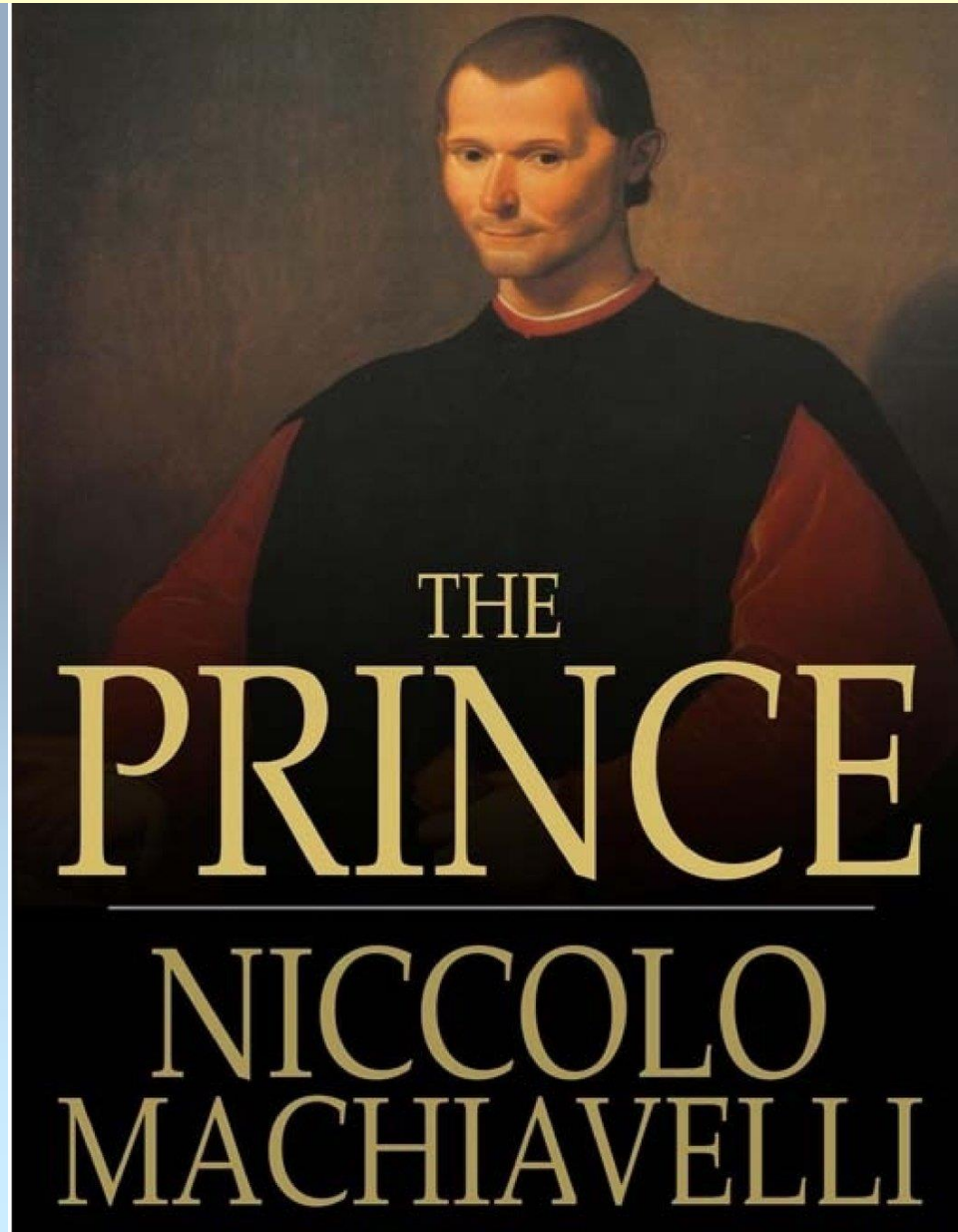
“Wisdom consists of knowing how to distinguish the nature of trouble, and in choosing the lesser evil.”

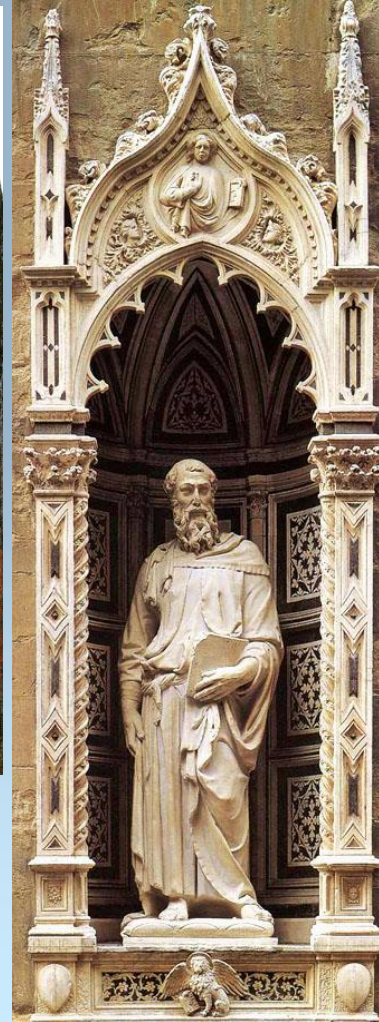

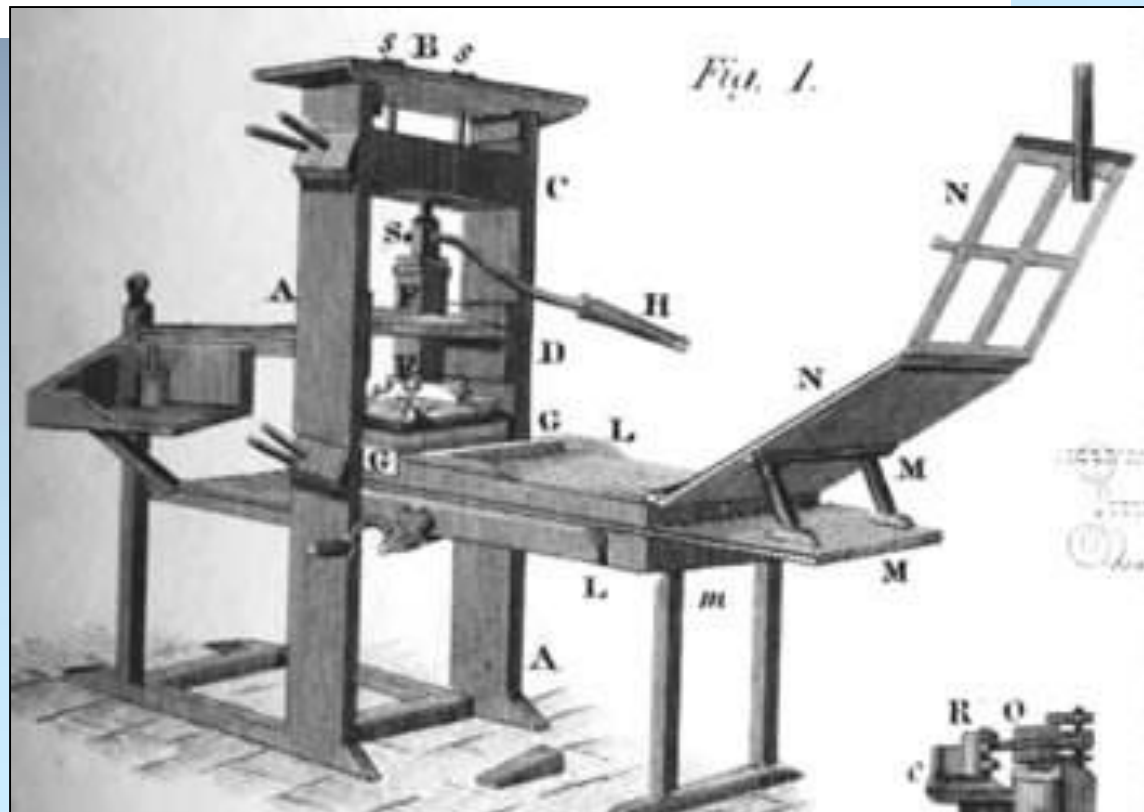

1439

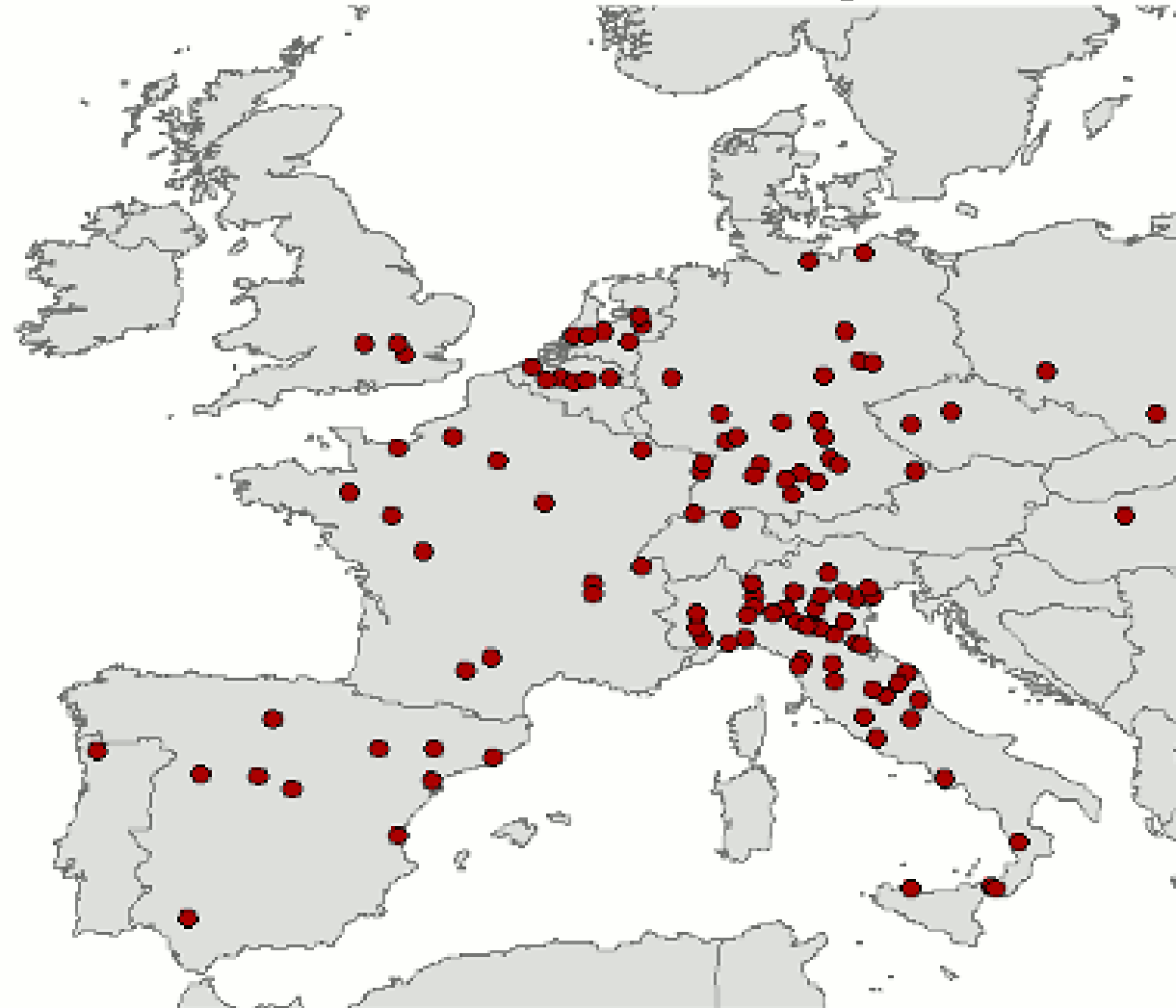

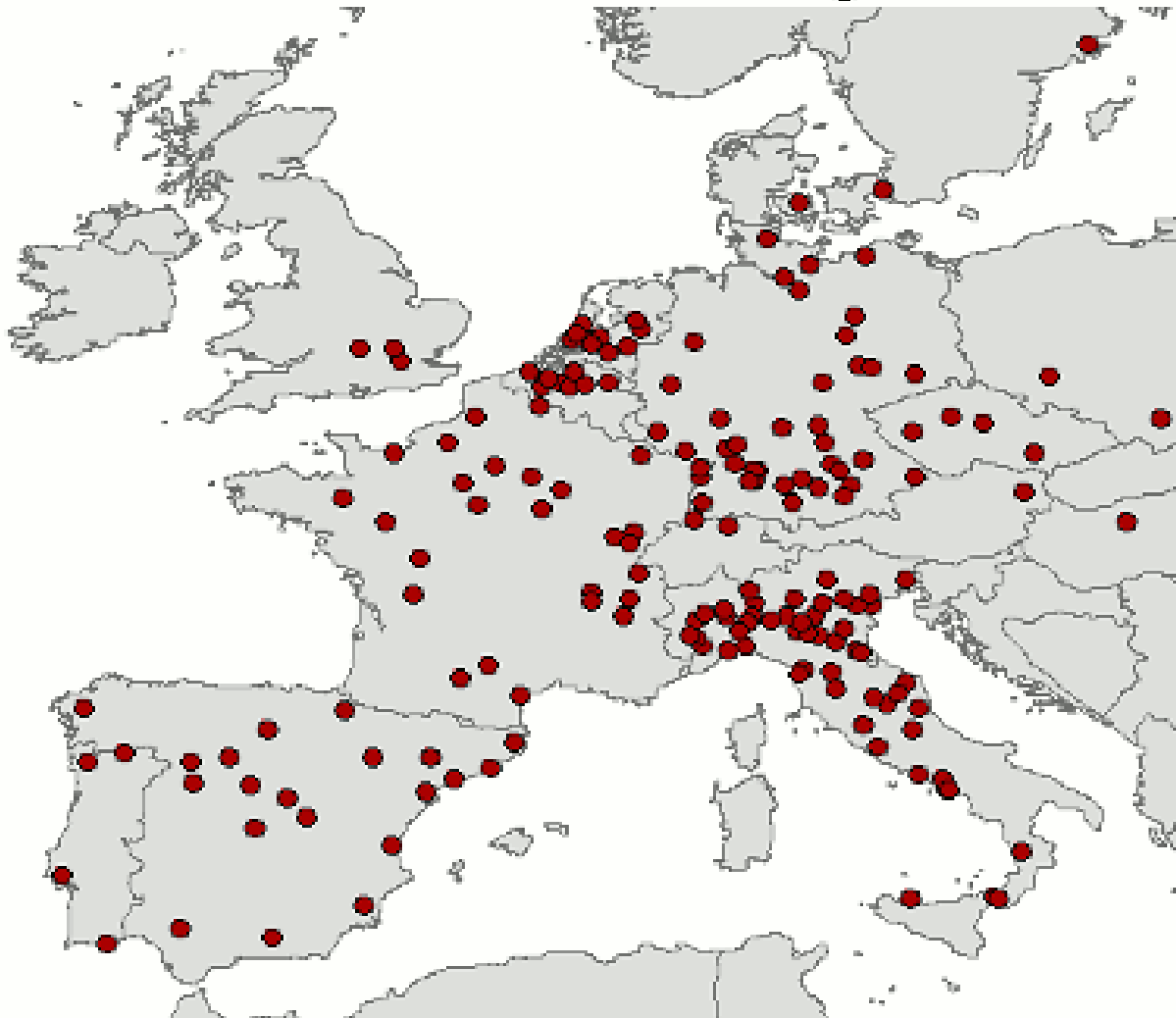

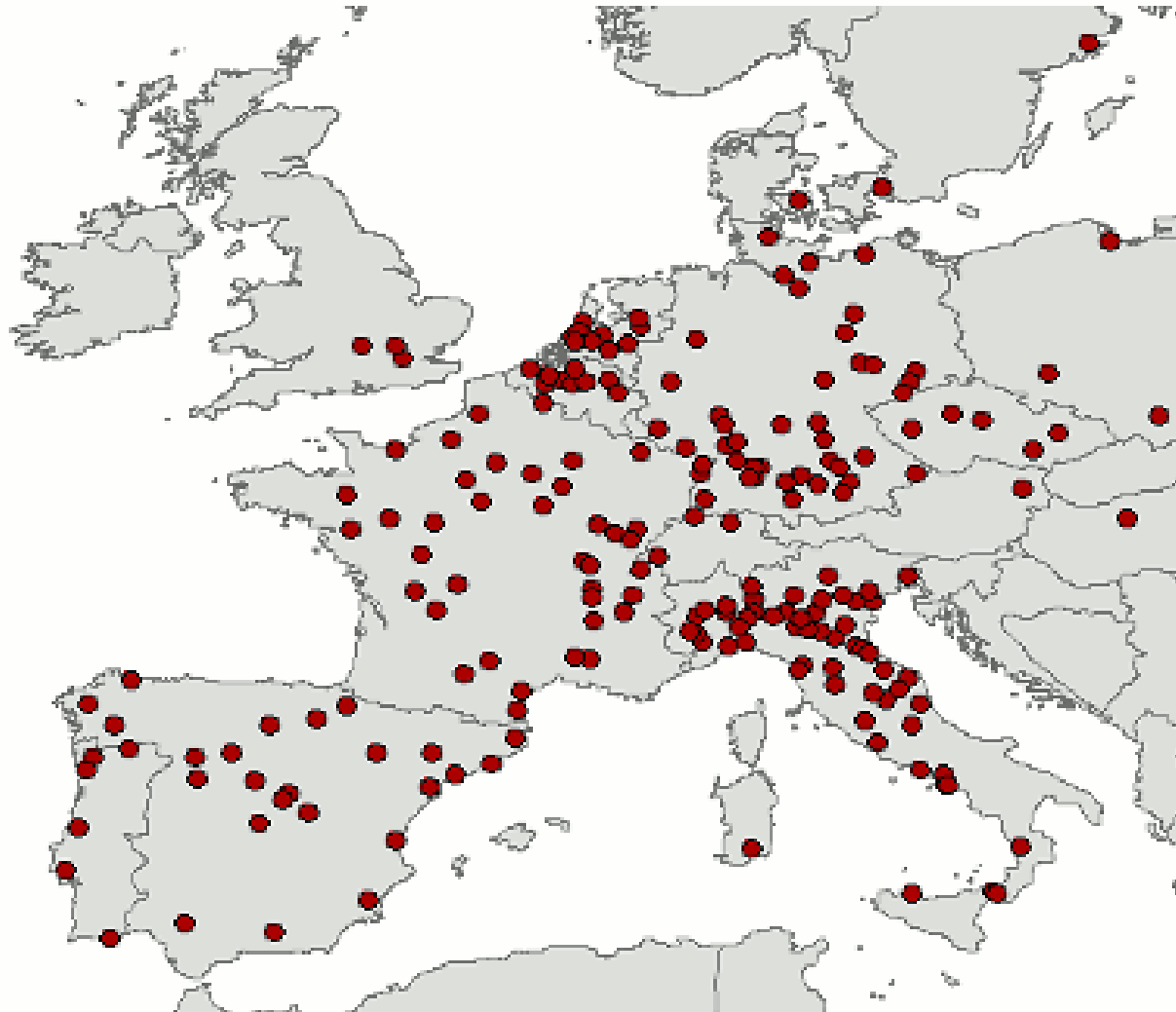

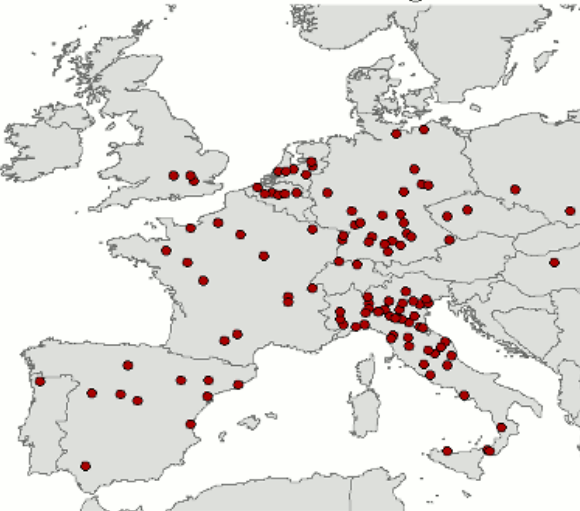

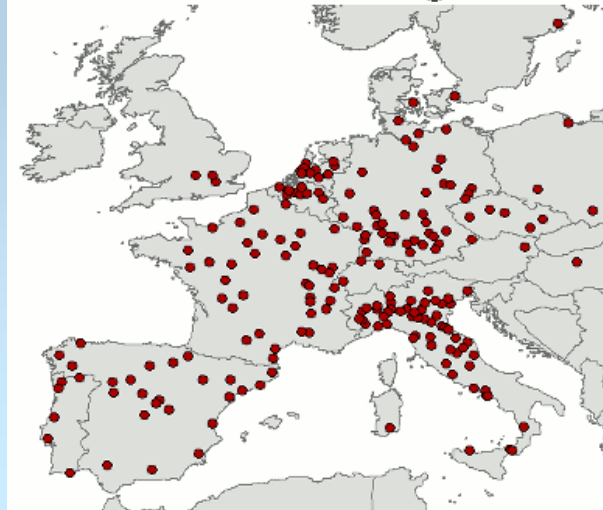
