Soldier, wounded at age 30

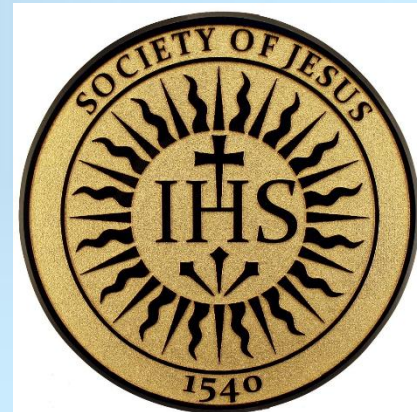
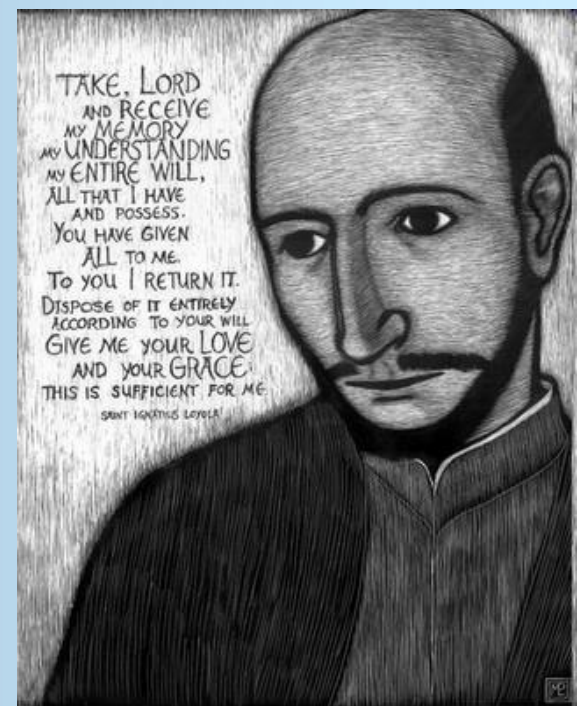
1522 – pilgrimage to the Holy Lands

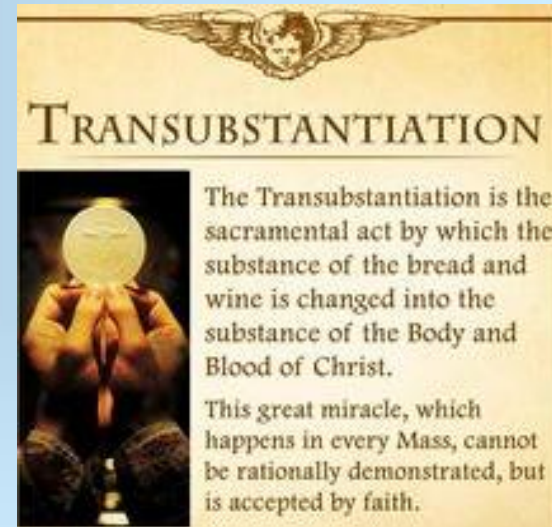

Begins with the Edict of Saint-Germain & Massacre of Vassy

Ends with the Edict of Nantes

With 2-4 million deaths in between



Religious Divisions in France During the Wars of Religion



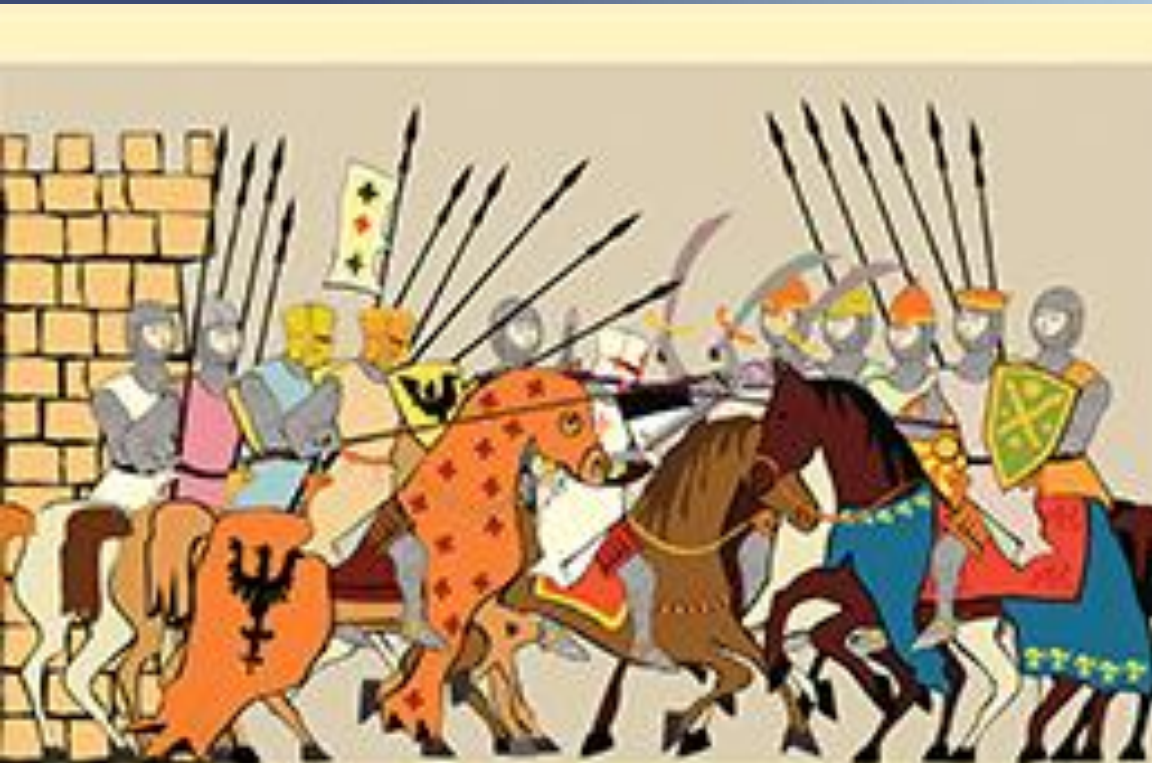
The St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre

Years of fighting – marriage - assassination took 2 tries – 10-20,000 killed

The **Edict of Nantes** brought an end to the religious wars between Roman Catholics and Protestants.

Henry VIII

Not just a King with the hots for some fresh eye candy

- 1501** Arthur, Prince of Wales is married by proxy to Katherine of Aragon. He is 15 and she is 16. He dies 4 months later.
- 1502** King does not want to return dowry (\$5,000,000) to Spain. Suggests she marries Prince Henry. Negotiations and approval of Pope takes 7 years.
- 1509** Marriage of Henry (17) and Katherine (23)
- Six pregnancies produce 3 sons and 3 daughters. Only Mary survives more than 2 months.

Mary I, Queen of England	18 February 1516	17 November 1558
Unnamed Daughter	10 November 1518	within a week

** 1st child born 7 months after wedding.*

Queen Katherine – Spanish
Princess Mary – marriage treaty with France

England Needs A SON!

Applies for marriage of 24 years to be annulled.
(or have 2 wives)

If Katherine had consummated marriage with
Prince Arthur, then Henry would be free to marry
Anne Boleyn.

As King, Henry would not yield allegiance to the
Pope or any non-English. The King was the
“Supreme Lord of the Church.”

Catholic, just not Roman

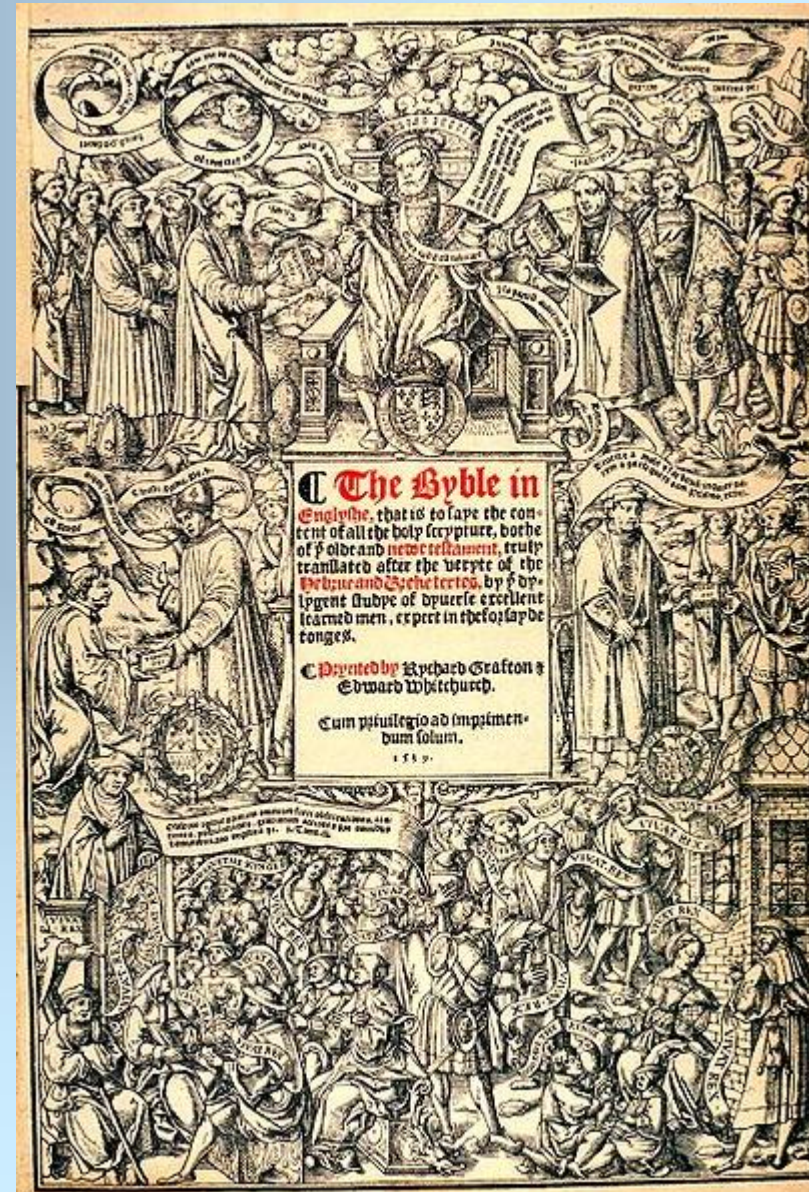
1. Still trying for a son
2. The King and England bows to none
3. Quit sending all that cash to Rome

Pope Clement VII refuses Henry's request for an annulment. Marriage to Catherine was permitted due to a papal dispensation.

Church of England created in 1534

**Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury
Develops of the Book of Common Prayer**

Pope Paul III excommunicates Henry in 1538.

Close the Monasteries ~ divert \$135,000,000/year

Release 12,00 monks, cannons, friars, nuns



To resist is High Treason

3 Abbots were Hanged, Drawn and Quartered

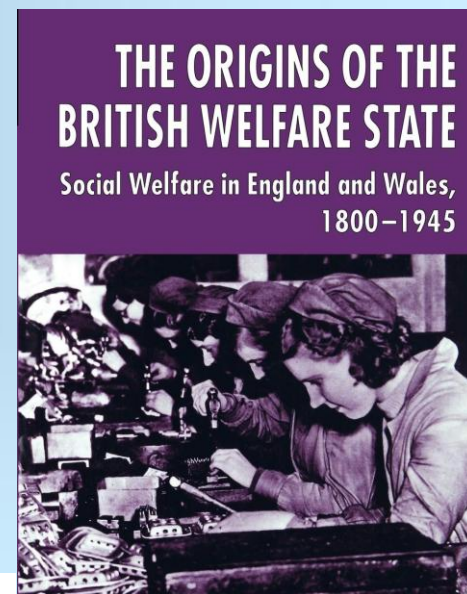
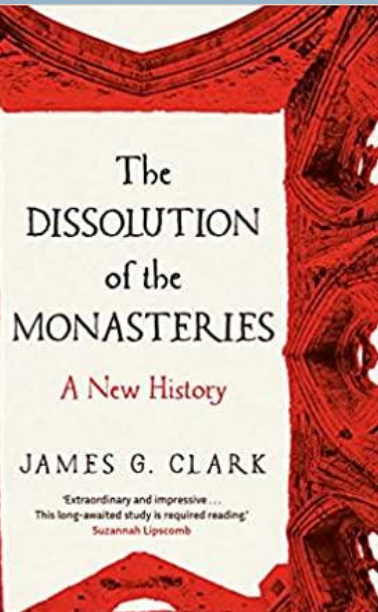
Henry VIII

Not just a King with the hots for some fresh eye candy

#2 - Anne Boleyn gives birth to Elizabeth I,
Judged by many as the greatest monarch
In English history.

*'I heard say the executioner was very good,
and I have a little neck,'*

#3 - Jane Seymour (married 10 days after Anne Boleyn's execution) gives birth
to Edward VI but she dies due to complications of childbirth.
Edward will reign from 1547-53 – dies at age 15.

#4 – Anne of Cleves - annulment after 6 months,

#5 – Catherine Howard – married at 16, divorced after 1 year, beheaded

#6 – Catherine Parr – Henry was 3rd of 4 husbands, died of childbirth fever 1
year after Henry died

Edward VI (r. 1538-1553)

King from age 9 to 13.

Realm governed by a regency council because Edward never reached his majority.

Church of England renounces Catholic doctrine

Terminally ill at age 15 Council works to prevent a return to Catholicism by naming Lady Jane Grey as heir (excluding half-sisters Mary and Elizabeth)

Mary I (r. 1553-1558)

Bloody Mary was not that bad...

*OK, she executed Lady Jane Grey to become Queen
and executed 280 religious dissenters*

- Age 2** promised to the Dauphin,
son of Francis I of France
- Age 6** contracted to marry her 1st cousin,
the Holy Roman Emperor
Charles V, then aged 22
- Age 11** marriage treaty provided that Mary
marry either Francis I, King of France
or his second son Henry, Duke of Orleans
- Age 37** marries son of King of Spain (1554- already Queen)
after 2 false pregnancies dies in 1558 of possible
ovarian cysts or uterine cancer.



**First woman
to rule England**

At Mary's death, Elizabeth becomes Queen and the last Tudor to reign.

Chapter 13 – *Reformation & Religious Warfare*

- 1558** Queen at age 25
- 1559** “Supreme Governor of the Church of England”
- 1583** colonized N. America
- 1587** beheaded Mary, Queen of Scots (1st cousin, once removed)
- 1588** defeated Spanish Armada
- 1600** chartered East India Company
- 1603** died – age 69, reigned 45

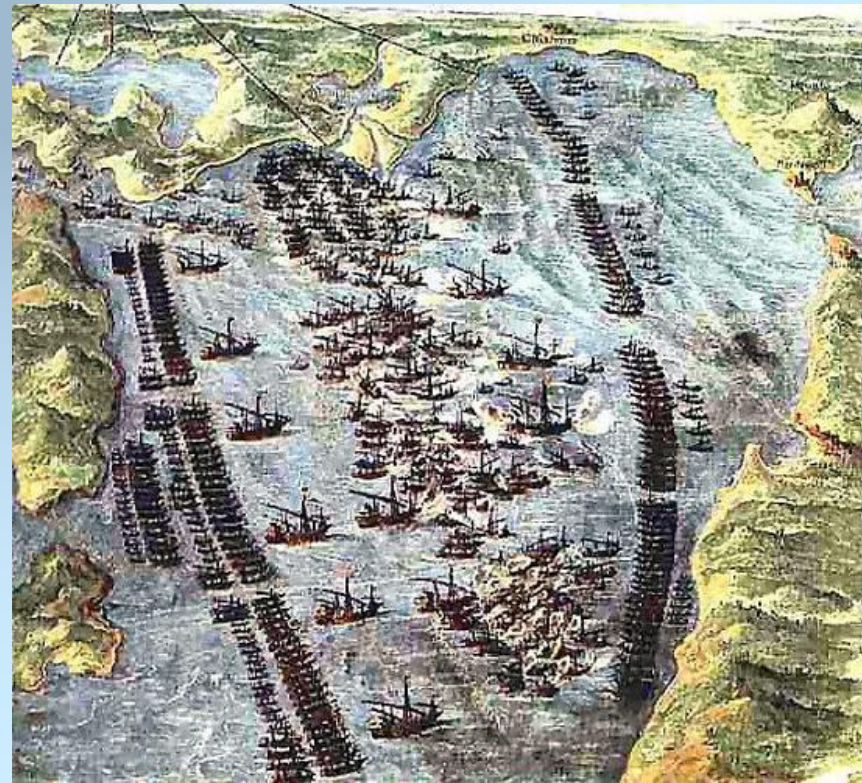
