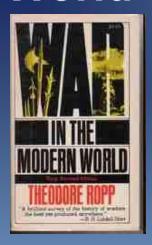

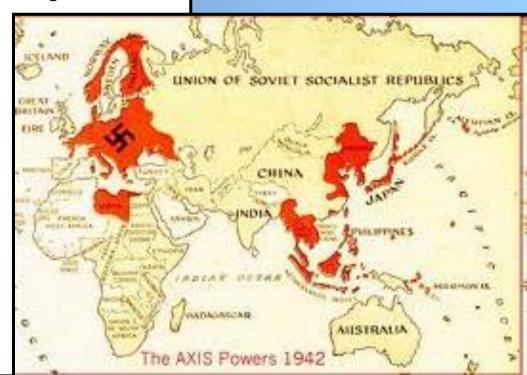


- 1. Second German War (Western Front & Africa)

(then we will attack USSR)


Battle of Britain

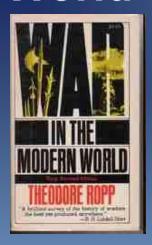



Hitler break pact with Stalin and attacks USSR on June 22, 1941






Logistical Support Status


Comparative Ability: A Model










The Global War, 1942-45





Call out the National Guard

The National Guard. The training of many of the NG men was extremely minimal. As in WWI, the Regulars deemed many Guard officers physically and otherwise unfit. 215,000 called to active serving in 1940.

ROTC. In 1940, 106,000 Reserve officers of high quality eligible for active service. Marshall regarded them as "probably our greatest asset during this present expansion."



By 1943, 12 million Americans had volunteer roles
Air-raid wardens, aircraft spotters, CAP
Disaster planning became a permanent function of
government, and was the chief legacy of wartime civilian
defense.






Greetings from the President





Comparison of War Production, 1942-1945







Establish base of operation to advance on Sicily and Italy




UK favors peripheral strategy to gradually weaken Germany
