

# **Assimilation/Association**

- Assimilation implied an effort to transform colonial societies in the Western image.
- Association implying collaboration with local elites while leaving local traditions alone.

## India *The Honorable East India Company Founded 1600 - traders*

Battle of Plassey (1757) – keep your powder dry Early 1800s – shift to export of raw materials (cotton)

# **India** *The Honorable East India Company*



1804 - census by William Carey indicates 300
cases within 30 miles of Calcutta.
1829 - Outlaw Sati and permit widows to remarry
1987 – Prevention of Sati Act

Upper Class mimic British in behavior, dress, food and leisure

India Sepoy Munity 1857-58

## **Cruelty of War**

Rebels kill loyal Sepoy NCOs and officers Indian soldiers kill civilians including women and children Sunni fear return to Shiite rule/ refuse to join Sikhs feared reinstatement of Mughal rule/fought with GB

The use of animal grease on the cartridges of the newly introduced Enfield rifles was the last straw. While loading the rifles, soldiers had to bite off the end of the cartridges. It was made up of either pig or cow fat, which violated the religious sentiments of the Muslim and Hindu soldiers.






### **Other causes:**

Fear that British would require Bengal Sepoy to deploy Masterminding mass conversions to Christianity Annexing providences cut off "overseas pay" Civilians lost land under "Doctrine of Lapse" British law did not recognize adopted for inheritance British justice system unfair/harsh

## India British Empire

Formed after the India Uprising 1857-58 (partitioned /independence 1947)





#### **Improvement, "the British Way":**

Transportation – railroads, to move troops and freight Traditions and customs too strong to change easily State universities and missionary schools

## Suez Canal (1869)

Several ancient Egyptian canals Some E-W others N-S

Napoleon uncovered ruins Planed canal but survey wrongly showed 10 ft difference

French plan construction 10 years with crew of 30,000 (over 1.5 million people total)

102 miles long and 28 feet deep HMS Newport beat French Imperial yacht Aigle November 17, 1869

British not happy.


Britannia rules the wave with sails.


Gain control in 1882 after suppressing Urabi Revolt in Egypt

End of Slave Trade – Seek New Commercial Opportunities Exploration and Religious Missionaries to "Dark Continent"

# Sub-Saharan Africa

## Anglo-Zulu War (1878-79) 10,000+ Zulu killed – 1,700 British

Initial Zulu victory at Isandlwana 22 January 1878 Over 1,300 British killed

*Rorke's Drift* 23 January 1878 (150 defenders vs. 3-4,000 Zulus) KIA: 17 vs. ~500

**Eleven Victoria Crosses** 





Avoid inter-European violence - Redraw map of Africa – disregard for ethnic groups






Scramble for Africa

"Straight Lines on a map equals War" - LTC Oakland McCulloch




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## Boer Wars (UK vs. Dutch farmers)



## British

7,894 killed 13,250 died of disease 934 missing


22,828 wounded

Boers

9,093 killed or died of disease

#### **Civilian casualties:** 27,927 Boer women and children died in concentration camps, (107,000 were interned).


## Boer Wars (UK vs. Dutch farmers)



## Barely a war, but

10 weeks with several small fights 1<sup>st</sup> time since American Revolution that British defeated and forced to sign treaty with unfavorable terms.

End of the "Redcoats" and battle flags

Diamonds in 1867 Zulu War in 1879


## Boers

A Boer refused to pay illegally inflated tax. His wagon was seized for auction.

## **Casualties**

British – 408 killed, 315 wounded Boers – 41 killed, 47 wounded

# **Boer Wars, Part Two**





## Background

Gold drew uitlanders (mainly British)

Complained of unfair taxs

Cecil Rhodes tried to create uprising in Johannesburg in 1895

Chamberlain demanded full voting rights and representation in 1899

# **Boer Wars, WHY???**

**Cost of the war** to the British government was £211,156,000 (\$28,978,000,000 in 2018 US dollars) 7,894 killed 13,250 died of disease 22,828 wounded

## **French Indochina** *Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia But not Thailand (Siam)*

French establish missionary efforts in the early 1600s

French East India Company established in 1664

Military involvement by 1858. Areas of Vietnam ceded to France.

French Indochina established at conclusion of Sino-French War in 1887

## French Control Indochina

- French come to control Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia
- Directly control French Indochina
- Export rice, angering Vietnamese

## **Colonial Impact**

- Modernization mainly helps European businesses
- Education, health, sanitation improve
- Millions migrate to Southeast Asia to work in mines, plantations
- Colonialism leads to racial and religious clashes








# **Thailand** (Siam)

Wise kings and role as a buffer state between British in Burma (India) and French in Indochina resulted in Siam remaining independent of European colonization.

King Mongkut (r.1851 to 1868) modernizes country

- Starts schools
- reforms legal system
- builds transportation & telegraph systems
- ends slavery





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#### **Chapter 21 – High Tide of Imperialism**



Philippines begins very limited self-government 1916 – promises eventual independence 1934 – Commonwealth of the Philippines 1946 – granted independence (delayed from 1944) USA defeats Spanish in 1898

Provides US with a far eastern base for trade and military

Philippine-American War 1889-1902 (Moro Rebellion 1899-1913)

The enemy of my enemy is my friend... until the common enemy is defeated.

## Casualties

US 1,000 KIA, 2,818 wounded 3,000 dead from disease Philippines: 12-20,000 KIA

"The price of empire was not inconsiderable."

#### USA GOALS:

- 1. Secure Manila
- 2. Destroy Army of Liberation
- 3. COIN (Counterinsurgency) Operations
