

7 May 1915



NOTICE! TRAVELLERS intending to embark on the Atlantic voyage are reminded that a state of war exists between Germany and her allies and Great Britain and her allies; that the zone of war includes the waters adjacent to the British Isles; that, in accordance with formal notice given by the Imperial German Government, vessels flying the flag of Great Britain, or of any of her allies, are liable to destruction in those waters and that travellers sailing in the war zone on ships of Great Britain or her allies do so at their own risk.



Long history of persecution under Ottoman rule since 15th c.


800,000- 1,500,000 Christians killed by Turks during WWI







Zimmerman Telegram Feb., 1917 British decode and copy to US Backfired – US enters WVI In April TELEGRAM RECE iter 14-08 arcon, State Days multificht futbundt FROM 2nd

FROM 2nd from London # 5747.

We intend to begin on the first of February unrestricted submarine warfare. We shall endeavor in spite of this to keep the United States of America neutral. In the event of this not succeeding, we make Mexico a proposal of alliance on the following basis: make war together, make peace together, generous financial support and an understanding on our part that Mexico is to reconquer the lost territory in Texas, New Mexico, and arizona. The settlement in detail is left to you. You will inform the President of the above most secretly as soon as the outbreak of war with the United States of America is certain and add the suggestion that he should, on his own initiative, inite Japan to immediate adherence and at the same time mediate between Japan and ourselves. Please call the President's attention to the fact that the ruthless employment of our submarines now offers the prospect of compelling England in a few months to make peace." Signed, ZIMMERMANN.

Lenin returns to Russia April, 1917 SUCCESS! – too little, too late


Germans decided to resume unrestricted submarine warfare in 1917

Germans took calculated risk & lost




Effect was to bring U.S. into war & ensure that Allies would <u>not lose</u>.




Adm. William S. Sims, U.S. naval commander in European waters:

Arrived in Br. in Apr 1917 and recommended use of convoy system.


Shipping losses dropped 75% in six months and 80% by end of 1917.


The U.S. Enters the War

Based in 1792 law not requiring Congressional approval.


British released damaging "Zimmerman Telegram."

WWI Casualty and Death Tables

One way to understand the violence and slaughter that occurred in the Great War is to examine the number of casualties aand deaths. Exact figures are still in dispute, because of different definitions used each category, the questionable accuracy of the recording system used and the loss or destruction of a number of official documents. The data in the tables below reflect numbers from several sources and are consistant with most experts' current estimates.

War Guilt Clause – Art. 231 - Germany should accept the blame for starting World War One **Reparations - Germany had to pay \$31.4 billion for the** damage caused by the war. (\$385 billion in 2011) Disarmament - Germany was only allowed to have a small army and six naval ships. No tanks, no air force and no submarines were allowed. The Rhineland area was to be de-militarized. **Territorial Clauses - Land was taken away from Germany** and given to other countries. Anschluss (union with Austria) was forbidden.
