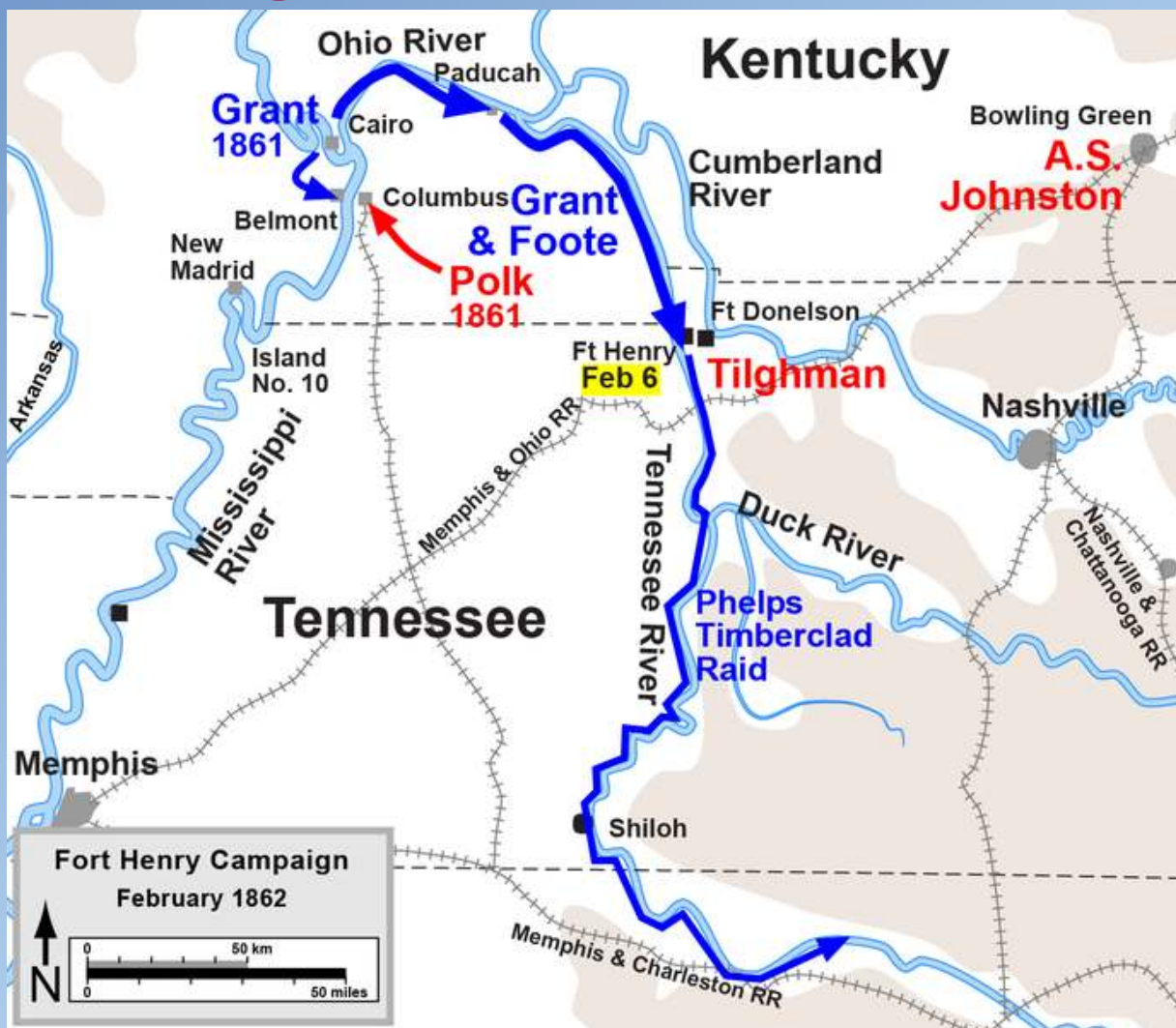
Western Campaign: Feb.-April 62

Feb 6, 1862

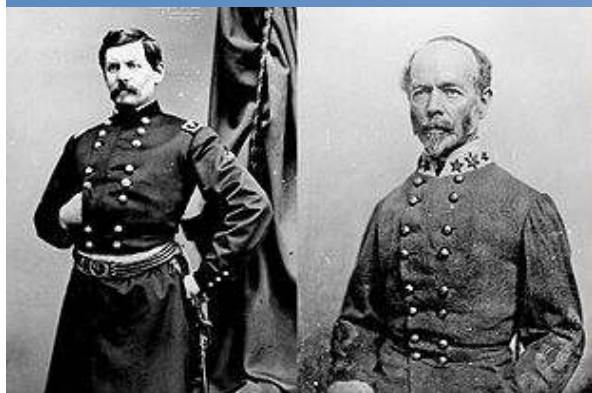
Ft. Donelson

Eastern Campaign: Peninsula March-July 62

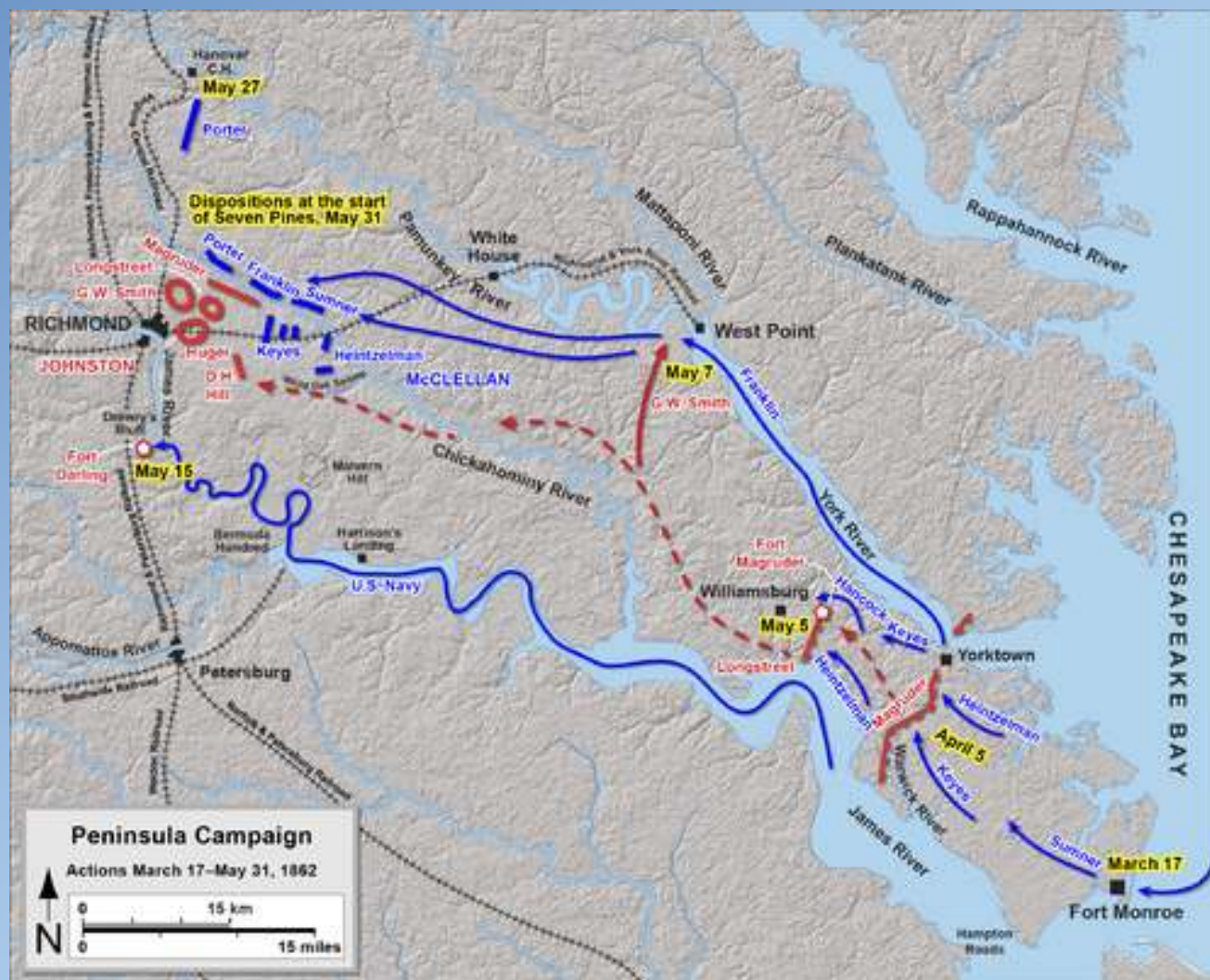

Eastern Campaign: Peninsula March-July 62

McClellan advances to within five miles of Richmond

Jackson's attacks in Shenandoah Valley threatens Washington DC. Federal troops recalled from VA

Battle of Seven Pines – CSA defeats USA.

J. E. Johnston wounded and R. E. Lee assumes command

Seven Days Battles

Mechanicsville (June 26-27)

Gaines's Mill (June 27)

Savage's Station (June 29)

Frayser's Farm (June 30)

Malvern Hill (July 1)

Maryland, My Maryland: Sept. - Dec. 62

Lee takes 55,000 men to Maryland

Goals: resupply
sympathy from slaveholders
weaken northern morale

Orders found wrapped around cigars

When McClellan moves fast, Lee goes on defense near Sharpsburg at Antietam Creek

Bloodiest day in American history

2,108 killed

9,540 wounded

753 captured/missing

CSA

10,316

1,546 killed

7,752 wounded

1,018 captured/missing
