From time to time I will contact the entire class using your university e-mail addresses and/or canvas. If you do not check your UM email on a <u>daily</u> basis, I suggest that you have it forwarded to your primary email address. I expect every student to check for course email not less than every <u>two days</u>. Therefore I will expect all email information to have been received after 48 hours of it being sent.

Office Hours: The preferred method of contacting the instructor between class meetings is by email. I will be available between 11:00 and 12:00 each Tuesday and Thursday. To meet outside of these times, contact Mr. Sirmon by email or phone.

Course Description: HI 297 *The American Military Experience* should develop students' awareness of the relationship of the military establishment to society, particularly in the United States. Further, the course should develop their interest in the evolution of war and the progression of military professionalism, give them an awareness of the history and purpose of joint operations, discuss the role of history in understanding their profession, and encourage the viewing of American military history from a joint perspective. It will also offer either a staff ride or battlefield tour, discussing the strategic and operational context of the battle, but focusing on the tactical level.

Course Objectives:

Upon the completion of this course, it is expected that the student will have a greater knowledge of:

- 1. The development of the US military
- 2. Tactical and Strategic importance of key battles
- 3. Introduction to Battle Analysis

- 4. Army and Branch Heritage
- 5. History of the profession of arms
- 6. Introduction to the Staff Ride

Assignments:

Assigned work includes, but is not limited to the following:

- 1. Complete all assigned reading assignments from the text before the class in which it will be discussed. Additional assignments or changes to the schedule may be made during the semester. Changes announced in class are the responsibility of the student.
- 2. On-line quizzes will be based on the readings assigned from *American Military History*. The deadlines for these quizzes are listed on the course calendar.
- 3. Journal Article Reviews: 750 word (approx. 3 pages) review of an article related to the material covered during each of the testing periods. The article reviewed must be at least 12 pages in length and be approved at least 1 week prior to the due date. An approved podcast may be substituted for one journal article. Reviews may be submitted electronically if the file is readable by MS-Word (2013) or Adobe Reader (PDF). A third review may be submitted. The highest two reviews will count toward the course grade. Late reviews will be penalized 10 points/day the assignment is overdue.
- 4. Each student will be required to write a 1250 word (approx. 5 pages) review of a book selected from the U. S. Army Center for Military History reading lists (available on course website). **The book must be approved by the fifth class session**. Class presentations, utilizing PowerPoint, will be limited to 10 minutes (not including questions from class and instructor). Dates for these presentations will be scheduled prior to the Mid-Term Exam.
- 5. The class will participate in a Staff Ride to a local historic battlefield utilizing materials developed by the Combat Studies Institute, Ft. Leavenworth, KS. Participation is required for all students currently enrolled in Military Science. Students not enrolled in Army ROTC may participate and receive extra credit.
- 3. Students are encouraged to attend various lectures that are related to the study of history. The UM History Club/Phi Alpha Theta has several activities each semester. The University of South Alabama History Department sponsors the Stallworth Lecture each fall. Information on approved events will be announced in class. Extra Credit points will be awarded (with proof of attendance) at events recommended by the instructor.

Final Exam Scheduling: Students are expected to take the final exam on the scheduled exam date. Students enrolled in face-to-face classes need to make all travel arrangements to accommodate the date of the final exam. The final exam should not be given early.

Participation:

Students are expected to have read the text prior to class so that they are able to engage in the discussion of the day's lecture. Lack of attention or failure to have a basic understanding of the material will have a negative impact on the student's grade. Experience has shown that the majority of students will not receive greater than 80 participation points.

Attendance:

You are expected to attend every class. You are also expected to be **on time** for class. Understandably, situations will arise that require you to be absent or tardy. These situations should not occur regularly. Roll will be taken at each class. Any absence or tardy will affect your participation grade. <u>Each unexcused absence will result in the loss of 3 points</u> from the Class Participation portion of the course evaluation.

Absences due to university-sponsored activities will be excused ONLY IF <u>prior arrangements</u> have been made with the instructor. Students who participate on UM athletic teams should have their coaches send a schedule of anticipated absences as early in the semester as possible. Students in performing arts ensembles should have their director notify the instructor as early as possible. It remains the **STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY** to make sure that this communication has taken place.

Unexcused absences from a test will result in a grade of **0**. Every effort should be made to contact the instructor as soon as it becomes apparent that the student will be absent from the scheduled test. <u>Arrangements</u> for making up the test <u>MUST</u> be completed within 4 calendar days of the absence.

Academic Dishonesty and Conduct Code

Students attending the University of Mobile are expected to reflect a high standard of academic integrity and conduct in accord with basic Christian principles and the mission of the University. Any student found to be disruptive in class, or copying, plagiarizing (with or without an intent to deceive), cheating, engaging in unauthorized use of a test, forging, or lying to a faculty member in order to complete an assignment will be subject to disciplinary action.

Each faculty member has the responsibility of defining his or her academic expectations at the beginning of each session or sub-session. If a faculty member discovers a student violating the academic integrity code, he or she must either 1) assign a grade of "0" for the test or assignment; or 2) refer the incident to a faculty committee appointed by the faculty member's dean. After the grading or ruling by committee, the incident, along with the evidence, is to be reported in writing to the vice president for academic affairs with a copy mailed to the student.

The office of the vice president for academic affairs determines whether the incident is the student's second offense and, if so, refers the matter to the academic affairs committee for disciplinary action. A student found guilty of a second offense is subject to academic suspension for up to one academic year. A third offense will result in academic dismissal. The student is entitled to appeal any case involving allegations of academic dishonesty or misconduct, in keeping with the appeal process outlined in the *Student Handbook*.
